

COAST REDWOOD BASIC CARE

Coast Redwoods are a mild-climate coastal species: They can take an occasional night-time dip to 20°F in Winter, but prefer year-round temps between 30° and 95°. With water when they need it and some strategic shading, Coast Redwoods can survive temps well into the 100°s.

Coast Redwoods enjoy the coastal influences of fog and mist, so, when cultivated in hotter, drier areas, they love frequent mistings and an ample supply of water (not constantly, but when they need it).

Containerized Coast Redwoods should be watered thoroughly, then their soil allowed to become close to dry before the next saturation.

Misting can occur as frequently as desired.

During spring and summer, outdoor Coast Redwoods not yet established in the landscape will need occasional deep waterings.

In areas where there are sub-freezing temperatures, heavy mulching can help protect the Coast Redwood's roots.

While a water-loving tree, Coast Redwoods do not want to live in a swamp or bog.

If in a container, the Coast Redwood will enjoy a dry-down period between deep waterings.

In hotter climates, partial shading or filtered sunlight is best. More sun is tolerated in colder climates.

Coast Redwoods can tolerate occasional lows into the 20°s, but should not be frozen solid.

Coast Redwoods tend to "bronze" (turn a brownish color) during fall and winter. This is normal and natural as there is dramatically less growing activity going on and less Chlorophyll in the foliage during these seasons.
